In a city obsessed with malls and big-box retailers, the East

Village provides shoppers with specialty urban shopping and dining. Buy gourmer cheeses at Basil Prosperi, or browse the latest wedding fashions at Schaffer's.

Just a few years ago, the neighborhood lying in the shadow of the Capitol was mostly abandoned and shuttered, serving only as an eyesore. Now booming, the area has steadily welcomed new businesses—from Sticks Gallery to Noodle Zoo—and has become a gentrified neighborhood. Most importantly, it has an eclectic, urban atmosphere rivaled nowhere in the city.

>The Hohberger Building at 502 E. Locust St. is one of only two cast-iron buildings downtown. The structure, built in 1898, was originally home to Woolworth's, a five-anddime store.

Amy Hassebrock opened her couture clothing store, Aimée, in the East Village

in 2004, because, like the clothing she sells, she wanted her location to be special. "Every type of retail in the East Village is unique," she says. "People want to come here because the shopping and restaurants can't be found anywhere else in the city."

The East Village is developing its own flair, complete

with a variety of events sponsored by the East Village Neighborhood and Merchants Association, including a holiday promenade and summertime street fairs.

Village Life

The East Village is getting just the additions it needs to complete the area's transformation into a resident-friendly neighborhood: loads of new lofts, condos, and apartments. Here are the living options popping up in the East Village:

East Village Square

The East Village Square brings 109 oneand two-bedroom apartments, including 21 ground-floor live-and-work lofts, to the neighborhood. Amenities include decks, tall ceilings, and unobstructed views of downtown, the river, and the Capitol. Look for ground breaking this summer and completion in late spring next year. 400 E. >Soho Lofts

Each of these 32 lofts offers high ceilings, oversized windows, and heated underground parking. Other features include the Village Green, an open-air courtyard, and combined live-and-work units on the ground floor. Units range in price from \$137,000 to \$327,000—for a corner two-story penthouse—and plans call for the building to be open in June. 400 E. Locust St., Sohodevelopment.com
